



<u>Night Witches</u> by Kathryn Lasky


Salt to the Sea by Ruta Sepetus

"As World War II draws to a close, refugees try to escape the war's final dangers, only to find themselves aboard a ship with a target on its hull"--.




The Help by Kathryn Stockett

The Book Thief by Markus Zusak



<u>Cold Sassy Tree</u> by Olive Ann Burns



adventures began, and an unimpeachably pious town came to life.




Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford
